

One Chicago police officer was killed

fatally injured early Wednesday, August 4th, while trying to stop a car fleeing from a nightclub in the Metro East.

The officer who died was identified by his family as Brian Pierce Jr., 24, who has been with Brooklyn force about nine months.

Pierce was struck by a car around 3 a.m. while trying to deploy stop sticks on the McKinley Bridge over the Mississippi River to flatten the tires of the car that had fled the nightclub, said Lt. Michael Lewis of the Illinois State Police.

Police are still searching for the driver who hit the officer.

"He was born with a passion to be a police officer," Pierce's mother, Tammy Pierce, told the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. "His favorite thing about police work was just being out in the public and stopping crime."

Pierce formerly worked for about two years with the police agency in Spillertown, Illinois, and was also a lieutenant with the Makanda Fire Department. Until he moved to Carbondale recently, he had been making the 100-mile drive every day from Makanda to Brooklyn to work the night shift, his mother said.

and another was critically wounded during an exchange of gunfire with at least one suspect during a traffic stop Saturday night in the West Englewood neighborhood on the South Side.

Police, family and the Cook County medical examiner's office identified the officer who died as Ella French, a 29-year-old who had worked as a Chicago cop since April 2018.

Andrew French said his younger sister always thought of others before herself.

"My sister's always been a person of integrity. She's always done the right thing even when nobody's looking. She's always believed in people and believed in doing the right thing. ... She's always believed in taking care of people that can't take care of themselves," he said.

Andrew French, an Iraq War veteran, said that "even before she joined the force," his sister was a proponent of therapy or social services over more jail time. He said she wanted to see people get the help they needed, more "than throwing people in jail."

"She was a humanitarian. She believed in human rights. She was one of the officers on the force that thought they needed reform," he said. "Because she's seen the front line, just like I have. She's always been a very caring person ... When I was in Iraq, me and her, we talked. And she has some attributes that you don't find in this world anymore."

Thirty-seven U.S. police officers were murdered in the first five months of 2021

As violent crime rises, so does the on-the-job risk for police officers. Forty-six were murdered in all of 2020.

WASHINGTON — With violent crime on the upswing across the nation, the number of police officers who have died violently in the line of duty is also spiking.

FBI Director Christopher Wray highlighted the issue in an appearance Tuesday, June 15th, before the House Oversight Committee. Wray said a total of 37 officers had been murdered in the first five months of 2021, compared with 46 during all of 2020.

"And that's not counting all those officers who've died in the line of duty facing the countless other inherent dangers of the job, like from a car accident in pursuit after a subject or drowning during an attempted rescue. Or even the scores of officers who've died from Covid-19.

Because, of course, law enforcement kept coming to work every day despite the pandemic."

According to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund, 148 police officers have died of all causes so far in 2021, up from 134 this time last year. Traffic deaths, in particular, have risen 42 percent, according to those statistics.

Police deaths mirror the increase in violent crime across the country. There were 56 shootings of four or more people in May, the highest number of mass shootings of any month since the Gun Violence Archive, a research nonprofit, started tracking the data in 2013.

Homicides are up by 20 percent or more in cities large and small. Included among the deaths has been a litany of police killings.

In May, two police officers were shot and killed in two separate incidents in California.

In April, a Capitol police officer was killed when a man drove into him as he rammed a barrier.

In February, two FBI agents were shot and killed in Miami while attempting to serve an arrest warrant in a child pornography case.

The FBI director revealed to Congress Tuesday he has made a condolence call each time it happens.

"Since August of 2017 when I started in this job, I've made more than 200 of those calls," he said. "And with each one I think about the friends and family members rocked by the loss of a loved one, the careers cut short and the communities hurting."

He added, "It takes a pretty special person to get up in the morning and put his or her life on the line for a total stranger."
