National Farm Safety and Health Week: Sept. 15–21, 2025

Since 1944, the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety (NECAS) has recognized the third week of September as National Farm Safety and Health Week. It coincides with the busiest part of harvest season, when farm equipment is on the roads, hours are long, and risks are higher for both farmers and drivers.

Illinois, with more than 27 million acres of farmland, is one of the nation's top producers of corn and soybeans. That means every fall, rural roads are filled with combines, grain trucks, and tractors. Unfortunately, this also means a rise in roadway accidents. According to the Illinois Department of Transportation, hundreds of crashes involving farm equipment happen each year, many preventable with patience and awareness.

## Public Safety Advisory: Stay Alert for Harvest Season in Rural Illinois

Springfield, IL — As Illinois enters the busy fall harvest season, Executive Director Jim Kaitschuk of the Illinois Sheriffs' Association urges residents—especially those in rural counties—to remain vigilant and courteous around farming equipment and operations.

"With harvest in full swing, farm activity on public roads increases significantly. We all share these roads. By slowing down, giving wide equipment plenty of space, and passing safely, we protect lives," remarked Kaitschuk. "This is especially important as we support our rural communities through a season that's both vital to our state's economy and inherently risky."

Congratulations to Deputy James Walls on graduating from the Macon County Law Enforcement police academy! He will now begin his field training phase.




#### **CASS COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE**

## **GET TO KNOW YOUR SHERIFF - Whiteside County**

What first made you get involved with law enforcement?

When I was younger, I saw people in my community step up to help others, and that left a lasting impression on me. With the guidance of family and mentors, I knew early on that I wanted to serve and protect people. What began as a calling to help my hometown has grown into a 34-year career, and that same motivation still drives me every day.


Describe your role as Sheriff in your Office and throughout your County:

As Sheriff, I'm responsible for leading the department, setting priorities, and making sure our deputies and staff have what they need to protect and serve effectively. I oversee our patrol, investigations, jail operations, and community programs, but I also spend a lot of time working directly with schools, local leaders, and residents across the county.

What is your favorite part about being Whiteside County Sheriff?

Making a real difference in people's lives every day. Whether it's a deputy going above and beyond to help someone, working with schools to protect kids, or connecting veterans with resources, those moments remind me why I chose this career. I'm proud to lead a team that serves with professionalism and compassion, and I value the trust the people of Whiteside County place

in me. The most rewarding part is knowing our work makes this county a safer, stronger community.



4. Describe what drives you to get involved within the community:

I believe that law enforcement is about more than just enforcing laws—it's about building trust and relationships. I want people to know we're approachable, that we care about their concerns, and that we're here to work with them, not just for them.

What's the best thing to happen to you because of your community or career in peace keeping service?

Over the years, I've had countless moments where someone has come up to thank me or one of my deputies for being there in a difficult time. Knowing that our work made a difference for a family, a child, or a victim is something I'll never take for granted. Those connections, and the trust people place in me as their Sheriff, are the greatest rewards of my career.







### Tell us about someone or something that has influenced you:

One of the biggest influences in my life was my college football coach, John Furlong. He made a lasting impression on me because he taught me the importance of discipline, accountability, and teamwork. He pushed me to give my best every day, but also reminded me that success isn't just about individual effort—it's about working together and supporting the people around you.



## What do you consider the biggest challenge in your community?

The impact of drugs—especially fentanyl and methamphetamine. These substances fuel crime, hurt families, and put lives at risk every day. Along with that, we also face challenges in keeping our young people safe and making sure they have positive paths forward.

Direct, approachable, and professional. I've always believed in being straightforward with people and treating them with respect, whether it's a citizen, a deputy, or a community leader. Most folks pick up right away that I take my job seriously, but they also see that I'm easy to talk to and genuinely care about what's important to them.

What advice would you give young people?

My advice to young people is to stay disciplined, surround yourself with positive influences, and never be afraid to work hard for what you want. Life is full of choices, and the decisions you make now will shape your future. Respect yourself, respect others, and remember that integrity matters—your word and your reputation will follow you for the rest of your life. If you stay focused and do the right things, opportunities will come your way.


